MSU EXTENSION SMART LANDSCAPES PROGRAM

The Crosby Arboretum is recognized as one of the first arboreta in the nation to fully embrace landscape sustainability in its design and management. And as they have discovered over the past 30 years now—it works! The Crosby Arboretum has inspired countless gardeners to understand that landscapes are living systems that can enrich our lives as well as our local environments. In March of this year, the American Society of Landscape Architects sent a survey out to its members to find out what people are most asking for in their residential landscape designs (available online at https://www.asla.org/NewsReleaseDetails.aspx?id=50027)

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The top three landscape elements that people across the nation are requesting include:

- Native/adapted drought tolerant plants (82.3%)
- Native plants (81.6%)
- Low-maintenance landscapes (79.25%)

Sound familiar? Many Crosby Arboretum members have implemented what they have learned from programs for using native plants and attracting backyard wildlife. At Mississippi State University, we are teaching our students in landscape architecture and contracting to design and manage landscapes in a sustainable way. This includes not only using native plants and attracting wildlife, but to minimize development footprints, build soil health, manage stormwater, and develop efficient landscapes, to name a few. And now we are bringing this knowledge to the Mississippi public.

Crosby Arboretum director Pat Drackett, Pearl River Country Extension agent Eddie Smith, MSU research assistant Simon Powney, and myself have developed a new Extension Service sustainable landscape training course entitled-- Smart Landscapes. The Smart Landscapes program will provide information on six important sustainable landscape practices that people can achieve in their own backyards. The main focus areas for the program include water management, backyard wildlife, healthy soils, plant diversity, energy conservation, and integrated pest management. This past summer we had sent out a survey on the interests of sustainable landscape topics and practices to Arboretum members and Extension clientele. We received 257 responses from across the state, and if you had responded to the survey, thank you for your strong interest in sustainable landscape practices in

input! We found out from the survey results that there is a Mississippi for the above topics. Even more importantly, many of you are already using good landscape practices in your own backyards and you would like to learn more about how to create a more sustainable landscape.

So, we are happy to announce a few avenues where you can do just that. First, a new Extension website will be available within the next few weeks entitled Mississippi Smart **Landscapes** (http://extension.msstate.edu/smartlandscapes) The website will feature a wealth of material where you can learn much more about each of these topics. Mississippi already has great resources available through MSU Extension experts, state agencies, and non-profit organizations; and we compiled them together into one spot for you. Also, we will have full-day training workshops beginning next year that will be held periodically throughout the state. Experts in these topics from Mississippi State University will give lectures and resources, and a full day of attendance will give you certification as a Mississippi Smart Landscape homeowner. Dates for upcoming trainings and registration will be listed on the Smart Landscape website, so be sure to visit it for updates!

PLANT PROFILE: Virginia Sweetspire (Itea virginica)





Virginia Sweetspire is a native sweet-smelling, showy shrub that is perfect for your landscape. This shrub's fragrant flowers attract a variety of pollinators in the late spring and summer, and its colorful fall foliage persists well into the winter. Sweetspire not only provides protection for a variety of small animals, but also serves as "eye candy" to those of us in the south looking for an indicator that a change in seasons has actually occurred. Plant this shrub in a group, as it tends to get leggy if it is planted alone. Sweetspire prefers moist, rich soils and will produce the most brilliant fall red and purple leaves, if it receives direct sunlight at least part of the day. FALL NATIVE PLANT SALE: PRE-ORDERS FOR POPULAR SPECIES

In order to provide a greater quantity of some of the most requested species, and to emphasize the fact that fall is the best season for planting trees, **the Arboretum is piloting an online tree and shrub sale.** Because this is the first time we are trying this, we'll be starting small. Therefore, **FOR ONE WEEK ONLY from September 24th -30th**, the Arboretum will be offering ten popular trees and shrubs for sale on our website on a first-come, first-served basis. You must order and pay in advance online. No phone orders will be accepted. Additionally, you must pick up your orders at the Arboretum during our regular fall plant sale hours on October 21st -22nd. When the ordering form becomes available on our website, we will announce this via our member email listsery, and on social media.

Please note we cannot issue a refund once an order is placed, so be certain you really want these plants. The ten species we intend to presell at this time (although the final list will be based on availability) include: Asimina triloba, Pawpaw; Chionanthus virginicus, Fringetree; Cliftonia monophylla, Pink Buckwheat Tree; Illicium floridanum, Starbush; Itea virginica, Virgina Willow or Sweetspire; Lyonia lucida; Fetterbush; Rhododendron canescens, Piedmont Azalea (pink); Rhododendron serrulatum, Swamp Azalea (white summer bloomer); Vaccinium elliottii, Elliott's Blueberry; and Viburnum dentatum, Arrow-wood. Inventory will be limited; however, many of these same species will also be available in limited numbers at the regular fall plant sale.


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


From Celebrating the Partnership Program 9-15-97, "New Partnership Continues a Proud Tradition"

From its early years – when a former Mississippi State University president and senior professors provided guidance – to the recent signing of a legal agreement of partnership, the Crosby Arboretum has come full circle in its affiliation with the University. The family of L.O. Crosby, Jr., conceived the idea for a living memorial to him at Christmas 1978, the time of his death. L.O. Crosby, Jr. (1907-78), whose father founded the Goodyear Yellow Pine Company, was a south Mississippi timber pioneer and philanthropist who loved the woods and horticultural pursuits and sought to preserve Mississippi's natural environment. Through the efforts of family and friends, planning began for what became the Crosby Arboretum in Picayune, Mississippi. The founders established the Crosby Arboretum Foundation in the fall of 1980, bringing together renowned professionals from diverse disciplines: botanists, landscape architects, and foresters. The first Board of Directors was elected in spring 1981, with William L. Giles, botanist and president emeritus of Mississippi State University, serving on the Board. The late Dr. Giles' relationship with the Crosby Arboretum was not the only early tie between MSU and the Arboretum. Mississippi State University Botanist Sidney McDaniel, Forestry Professor George Switzer, and Ed Blake, landscape architect at MSU and later Arboretum Director, were chosen by the Board as consultants in 1981 and provided their expertise to the development of the project for many years. In 1983, MSU graduate Chris Wells was hired as the first employee. The Crosby Arboretum has expanded to become a premier regional native plant conservatory.

The Crosby Arboretum is now part of the Division of Agriculture of Mississippi State University. It has the direct support of such departments as Landscape Architecture, Wildlife and Fisheries, Forest Resources, and Plant Sciences. However, other divisions of the University, including the College of Arts and Sciences, will play a vital role in the long-term growth and success of the Arboretum. Administratively, the Arboretum is part of the Coastal Research and Extension Center, a complex of the Experiment Stations and Extension activities, spanning all of South Mississippi. The mission of the Coastal Research and Extension Center is to identify and conduct research and educational programs that will enhance the quality of life of residents in South Mississippi.






